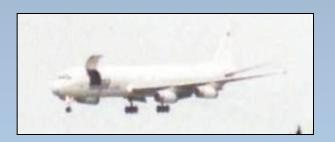
Routine Air Freight

Therefore, standards enforced through contract.



We aim to avoid incidents like this!

TAA Lessons Learned



- ✓ Include airworthiness clauses in contracts
- ✓ Ensure initial and continuing airworthiness assessments are part of the bid evaluation process
- ✓ Ensure right of access to and ownership of data
- ✓ Outsourced maintenance and engineering support results in reduced military expertise
- ✓ Ensure Type Certificate holder and Senior Design Engineer internal to Crown
